

CRUISING THE AMAZING PANAMA CANAL...and beyond

The historic opening of the Panama Canal occurred in 1914, but even today it remains one of mankind's most remarkable engineering achievements - often referred to as the "Eighth Wonder of the World."

Although only 40 miles from shoreline to shoreline, the ingenuity and tenacity of the canal's creators is evident with each and every movement of the complex system of locks that make the canal possible. Today, a "cruise between the seas" - the Atlantic and Pacific - can be an extremely fascinating journey, exploring the diverse cultures of Central America and visiting a variety of tropical paradises in South America, Mexico and the Caribbean along the way.

During the canal crossing there are many splendid sights, including the impressive Gatun Lake, which covers 163 square miles and accounts for about half of the canal's length. When it was created, Gatun was the largest manmade lake on earth (until the Hoover Dam came along).

The scenic beauty of the lush green jungle often obscures some of the more interesting places along the canal. The colorful city of Casco Viejo was a stronghold against pirates during the French attempt at building a canal in the 1800s. It is rich in history and still radiates an atmosphere of old French sophistication.

Beyond Panama, one of the most anticipated ports of call on this cruise is Costa Rica. Visitors can enjoy a variety of adventurous excursions here, including riding a zip-line through the Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve. Nature lovers are wowed at Tortuguero National Park on the northern Caribbean coast and other preservation areas that are home to some 850 species of birds and more than 200 species of mammals.

THE PANAMA CANAL **TRANSIT**

Spaniards conceived the idea in 1502. By linking the Pacific and the Atlantic over the Isthmus of Panama, the long sailing route around South America could be avoided and the wealth of the Indies more readily obtained. But for centuries no one felt bold enough to embark on the ambitious project. It was a Frenchman, Ferdinand de Lesseps, who eventually tackled the job of starting to build a canal in 1879. Sadly, the 10-year project failed miserably due to poor planning and financial difficulties.

But in 1902, President Theodore Roosevelt revived the dream. The United States purchased the French holdings in Panama for a record \$40 million and construction began. For more than a decade, despite diseases such as malaria, pneumonia and tuberculosis, as well as poor sanitation and unbearable temperatures which sometimes rose to 130 degrees, hardy workers toiled in their massive concrete basins. Thousands lost their lives.

Finally in 1914, the rewards of their efforts were realized The Canal was officially opened. Even today it remains one of the greatest engineering feats in history; a triumph of human ingenuity and of the human spirit.

Those who take the 50-mile Canal journey return significantly impressed. During the nine-hour transit, ships pass through a series of locks, raising the mighty vessels 85 feet above sea level. The ships are then guided by electrical locomotives called mules, and continue to sail along Gatun Lake, the largest manmade lake in the world.

AMSTERDAM CITY OF CANALS

Considered the world's most cosmopolitan city when it was the wealthiest during the 17th century Golden Age, Amsterdam, the official capital and cultural center of Holland, intrigues visitors with its wealth of museums, canals, bridges and unique architecture – and, of course, its deeply rooted Dutch ancestry.

Known as the "Venice of the North," Amsterdam sits three feet below sea level and has more than 100 canals and 1,100 bridges. Small houseboats and floating flower shops line the canals.

To truly get the feel of the city, it is best to walk along its major avenues, narrow cobblestone streets and canals. At night the scene is especially romantic, as Amsterdam's many bridges become aglow with lights and waterways reflect images of the tightly knit buildings lining them. Be sure to duck into one of the many "brown cafes" to sample the ale.

A canal boat tour is one of the most peaceful ways to see the city's 17th century merchants'

houses, bridges, church spires, houseboats and locks. But with a selection of at least 40 museums and art galleries, one cannot overlook Amsterdam's cultural side. Of particular interest is the Rijksmuseum, which houses a great variety of art collections, and the Van Gogh Museum, which has dedicated an entire floor to the master. Be sure to also make time for a sightseeing stop at Anne Frank's House and Museum.

If you're fortunate enough to be in the Netherlands during its eight weeks of Tulip Time, you'll undoubtedly enjoy an excursion southward to the 70-acre Keukenhof Gardens. This is one of the most impressive public gardens in the world, with more than seven million tulips of every size and color, along with sculptures and other works of art in exotic outdoor displays and within the massive glass pavilion.

In the Netherlands, culture and art flourish and friendliness prevails. And you're never far from a picturesque byway.


