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

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


TAUCK REVEALS DETAILS OF NEWEST RIVERBOAT



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

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

THE DAZZLING DALMATIAN COAST

Hvar, Croatia

The long, rugged Dalmatian coast, backed by high mountains with hundreds of offshore islands, is fast becoming one of Europe's most popular vacation spots. In this region of Southeastern Europe you'll find a rich blend of history and culture, including many Greek and Roman ruins, enlightening museums, delicious Mediterranean-inspired cuisine and hundreds of picturesque islands and charming medieval towns just waiting to be explored.

No visit to

Dalmatia is

complete without

a stop in the

boisterous port of

Split - Croatia's

second largest

city.

George Bernard Shaw called **Dubrovnik** "the pearl of the Adriatic" because of its incomparable architectural heritage. The gleaming marble streets of Dubrovnik are lined with baroque buildings punctuated by beautifully sculpted Renaissance fountains, ramparts and facades. Dubrovnik's scenic medieval walls, which are an UNESCO World Heritage Site, are the most intact and impressive in the Adriatic and head the long list of the city's must-see sights.

But Dubrovnik is more than a fascinating old town with an ancient history. It's also a first class Adriatic resort. Stretching out from the historical center is a network of beaches to laze away the day in the sun. Offshore, the crystal-clear sea is dotted with wooded islands that make for great day trips. And the array of cafés, bars and clubs in and around the Old Town ensure that Dubrovnik at night is never dull. The nearby seaside town of Cavtat is the southernmost town in Croatia, and makes for a nice getaway from the

crowds of Dubrovnik. The promenade along the water is a postcard-perfect spot for shopping, dining and soaking up the sun.

Speaking of sunshine, the island of **Hvar** boasts 2,718 hours of it a year, making it Croatia's sunniest island. In recent years it's become one of southern Europe's most visited islands, attracting a diverse crowd of backpackers, yachters, honeymooners and pretty much anyone who visits Dalmatia. The throbbing nightlife and Venetian architecture

of the Old Town is the highlight. The island is extraordinarily verdant and lush, filled with lavender, heather and pines, and the coastline is heavily indented with an abundance of rocky coves, making it ideal for snorkeling and diving. Old Town makes an excellent base for exploring, as there are several other charming towns to see, including Stari Grad, the tiny port of Jelsa, the picturesque village of Vrboska or the even more miniscule port

of **Milna** on the southern coast. Day trips to the Pakleni Islands also offer excellent scuba diving.

Farther north, **Zadar** is one of the Adriatic's most historically interesting towns with a wealth of sightseeing and exciting nightlife. Zadar was founded by the Romans, attacked by the Turks, ruled by the Austrians and made part of Italy until 1943 when the Germans moved in. In recent years Zadar has undergone a startling revival. Cafés and bars are filled, museums and churches have been restored and tourists pour in to take boats to nearby islands.

No visit to Dalmatia is complete without a stop in the boisterous port of **Split** – Croatia's second largest city. Diocletian's Palace is the city's prize jewel, and dates back to 300 AD. The palace is more like a city within a city, and covers more than 10 acres. Part imperial villa and part fortified camp, it is remarkable for the diversity of shapes within its architecture, which include the octagonal domed Cathedral St. Domnius, the rectangular Temple of Jupiter, the cruciform lower level of the Vestibule

and circular temples to Cybele and Venus.

Perhaps one of the best-kept secrets of Dalmatia is the city of **Kotor** in Montenegro. Founded by the Romans, Kotor developed in the Middle Ages into an important commercial and artistic center with its own famous schools of masonry and iconography. Throughout its turbulent history, a variety of impressive buildings have been erected. The largest of these is the St. Tryphon Cathedral. Much of the city was damaged during an earthquake in 1979, but it has been painstakingly restored. The city is once again flourishing and is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

ALASKA: Explore its Untamed Wilderness

In a way, Alaska is like that really big back yard one of your friends had growing up. You always looked forward to visiting, because there was so much room to roam, explore, play and discover. Similarly, the 49th state is America's big back yard.

With each visit, you can find out something new. A person could visit Alaska every month for the next 100 years and still not come close to seeing even half of the Great Land. Now those are estimated statistics, and yes, I just made them up. But still, it sounds true, doesn't it? And that's the funny thing about Alaska – not even hyperbole can do it justice. You have to see and experience it up-close it in all its glory and grandeur to fully appreciate it.

A great place to start this journey of discovery is in Southeastern Alaska. Its busy history is one of gold mining, timber cutting and salmon fishing. Ketchikan, on the southwest side of Revillagigedo Island, grew up around salmon canneries and sawmills. Ketchikan's name supposedly comes from the native term "Katch Kanna," which roughly translates: "spread wings of a thundering eagle." At one time Ketchikan was proclaimed the "Salmon Capital of the World." An outstanding collection of totem poles make a visit to Ketchikan essential for anyone interested in Native art. Travelers flock to Ketchikan for their first look at the North Country, and are rarely disappointed.

Called "Shee Atika" by the Tlingit Indians, then "New Archangel" by the Russians who ousted them, the town of Sitka boasts a rich multicultural heritage, and is often the starting point of an Alaska cruise. Two dozen of its attractions are on the National Register of Historic Places, including Castle Hill and Building 29, a structure built by the Russians in 1835. The Sheldon Jackson Museum exhibits one of Alaska's oldest native culture collections. Exciting shore excursions here include ocean raft adventures, an ATV expedition and a cycling tour. More relaxed diversions include nature walks through the forest and catamaran tours.


Few one-time boomtowns retain the flavor of the gold rush days like Skagway. This gateway to the Klondike is preserved as a national historic park with its rustic boardwalk and frontier-style storefronts. In addition to walking tours of the historic town, you can enjoy a ride on the White Pass Scenic Railway. It's one of the oldest narrow gauge railways in the U.S. and offers amazing views of the surrounding mountains. You can also choose to hunt for riches on a gold-panning excursion, glide through the forest on a zip-line adventure, or hop aboard a dog sled for a thrilling ride.

Perched on a thin strip of land at the mouth of Gold Creek, Juneau is arguably one of America's most beautiful state capitals, with the looming summits of Mt. Juneau and Mt. Roberts providing a gorgeous backdrop. Nearby, scenic Admiralty Island has the world's highest concentration of brown bears. If you are lucky enough to see one, it is a memory of a lifetime. Juneau is also where you can witness the amazing Mendenhall Glacier, which is 12 miles long and 1.5 miles wide. There are hiking trails into the area, and the Mendenhall Visitor Center is a wealth

of information. For a bird's-eye view, the Mt. Roberts Tramway offers a short, six-minute trek to the top of Mt. Roberts, 1,800 feet above the city.

One port that is being seen on more 2011 Alaska cruise itineraries is Icy Strait Point. Also known as "Hoonah" (where the North wind doesn't blow), this small town is found on the leeward side of Chichagof Island. This is a spectacular spot for wildlife viewing as the animals easily outnumber the people. Watch for bears, eagles and humpback whales. The thriving salmon population also makes it a great spot for fly-fishing.


